Why do bad things happen to good people?

Last week, terrorists bombed a crowded street in Kabul, Afghanistan, killing one hundred people. The bombers had disguised themselves as medical personnel and drove an ambulance past police checkpoints to avoid detection before detonating the devices. Every year nearly four-thousand people, including children die as a result of violence in this war-torn country. What wrong did they do?

It breaks our hearts when we see a person suffering with illness. What have they done to deserve this?

Where is God? Does God not care? Why does God allow good people to suffer? It has led many to come to the conclusion that life is meaningless, that faith is useless and that there is no God. This lament is not new. It is the lament of Job.

The Book of Job was written around the year 500BC but its story is timeless. It deals with the question: 'Why do bad things happen to good people?' Job and the people of his time believed that good would be rewarded and evil would be punished. They did not believe in heaven or hell. The dead, both the righteous and the unrighteous, went to Sheol, a dark place cut off from life and from God. Job was a prosperous man with a large family. His prosperity was a blessing, a reward for his righteousness. However, in one instant, all of that is taken away from him. His family and his flocks drop dead and he loses everything. His loss must now be a punishment from God for some evil he has done. Yet, Job knows that he has done nothing wrong.

Job laments, he curses the brokenness of the human condition. Life is meaningless and cruel. Things happen for no reason at all and there is no point in being good or having faith in God.

Jesus Christ changes that perspective completely. In Jesus, we see a God who is not distant or uninterested but a God who chooses to share our wounded humanity and chooses to live in our wounded world. Jesus is drawn to Peter's mother-in-law, moved with compassion for her suffering. Yet, Jesus' mission is not simply to be a miracle worker. Jesus' mission is to help us have faith in a much greater hope that is beyond this world.

The question of suffering has no easy answer. Many people come here to the Novena Church to find healing and hope, to find comfort in a God who shares our wounded humanity.
