The Mighty Double-edged sword

Imagine Jesus in the midst of a battle. His many enemies surround him, and he is holding a sword of burnished steel with both hands. As his enemies run to attack, he wields the mighty sword, and his enemies fall with every swing of his sword.

Before firearms using gunpowder came into existence in Thirteen Century Europe, the sword was the weapon of war and defense. Metals sharpened and soldered to a handle were used to cut, thrust and kill. The double-edged sword was the mightiest sword because the blade could cut both ways. But the person using the sword had to be an accomplished swordsman. He had to be strong and relentless. He had to keep moving around, slashing and thrusting in one direction, and then quickly changing to another direction.

In the 2nd Reading, the writer of the Letter to the Hebrews uses the metaphor of the double-edged sword to describe the power of the Word of God. Not only is it alive and active, the Word can cut so finely and cleanly. The Word uncovers everything and reveals all to God, the Father and Creator. There will be no secrets before the Lord!

The Word of God cuts through the darkness, hypocrisy and falsehood. In this current world of 'Fake News', the Word remains the standard of truth, right and good: "For the word of the Lord is right and true; he is faithful in all he does." (Psalm 33:4)

Although, it seems that world's values, sin and evil are 'winning', Jesus promised that his word will endure and will prevail: "Heaven and earth will pass away, but my words will never pass away." (Matthew 24:35)

But Jesus is the Word. So everything said about the "Word of God" applies to him. Jesus, himself, is the mighty double-edged sword that will destroy and defeat Sin and Death. He is the promised Messiah who "will crush the head of the serpent". (Genesis 3:15)

So what do I do with this double-edged sword? I use it. I will reflect, ponder and apply in my life the Word of God, as it is revealed to me in the Holy Scriptures. As Jesus said: "Blessed rather are those who hear the word of God and obey it." (Luke 11:28) For example, when Jesus in the Gospel says, "forgive" and "pray for those who hurt you", I now pray for the grace to let go and forgive. When St. Paul says that God "loves a cheerful giver", (2 Corinthians 9:7), I now examine the ways I can give more generously; not just money, but my time and energy. As the word uncovers and reveals my true motives and attitude, may my life be more pleasing to the Lord.

Finally, in all my 'ups and downs', I trust in the Lord, and hold tightly to the cross: "You are my refuge and my shield; I have put my hope in your word." (Psalm 130:5)

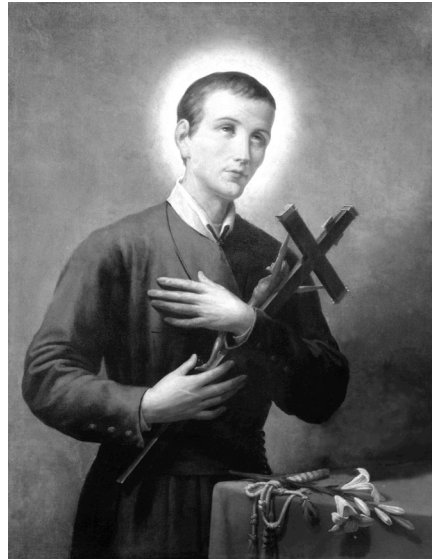
16th October, Feast of St. Gerard Majella, CSsR

Gerard Majella was born in Muro Lucano (Potenza) in southern Italy on 6 April 1726 in a family of humble circumstances. From his parents, Gerard learned the love of prayer and sacrifice. When his father died, Gerard, being the only son, had to provide for his family by working as a tailor.

At the age of 14, he sought to enter the Capuchin friary but he was rejected because of his delicate health. After a short time as the domestic servant of the bishop of Lacedonia, he returned to tailoring, but with minimal income.

In April 1749, with utter tenacity, he succeeded in getting himself accepted by the Redemptorists who had preached a mission in Muro. After a trial period and a year of novitiate in the house at Deliceto, he made his religious profession on 16 July 1752.

He was very observant of the rule, while at the same time going about the surrounding countryside to collect money for the material needs of the community. His presence to people, who were weighed down by poverty and illiteracy and at the mercy of epidemics and crop failures, was seen as a sign of hope.



Gerard had a deep empathy for them and gave to all a testimony to trust in the love and the compassion of God. During his five years as a lay brother in the Congregation, he was remarkable for his apostolic zeal, his patience in sickness, his love for the poor, his deep humility in the face of false accusation, heroic obedience, his spirit of penance and his constancy in prayer. He died at Materdomini (Avellino) on 16 October 1755.

He was beautified by Leo XIII on 29 January 1893 and canonized by Pius X on 11 December 1904. Remembered among the people for his love for them. he is especially invoked as patron for mothers, particularly in time of pregnancy and for their infants.
