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A blessing on the man who puts his trust in the Lord

The readings for this Sunday all point to the fact that putting our trust in the Lord, with our faith anchored on Him would be the enlightened path to take. Why so?

The first reading from the Book of Jeremiah shares with us that the wise man "is like a tree by the waterside that thrusts its roots to the stream". If we examine nature closely, we will understand that it will show us principles of survival. Just like how the tree or a plant gravitates itself to the source of life and nutrition, human beings would also put themselves in the best possible circumstances to survive.

The second reading from the first Letter of St Paul to the Corinthians elaborates on the meaning of death and Resurrection, how Christ has through His own death and resurrection redeemed the world.

The two readings "build up" to the gospel reading from Luke where Jesus shares The Beatitudes. In particular, I would like to share my reflection on the following:

"Happy are the poor, yours is the kingdom of God" - when I cultivate a humble and lowly disposition, I can then better appreciate the awe of the kingdom of God. Being aware of what I do not know helps me to be open to learn and embrace the larger universe created by God.

"Happy you who are hungry now, you will be satisfied" - the hunger could mean the hunger to know Jesus and walk with Him. As I continue to be hungry and thirst for the Word, I would then understand that being a disciple of Christ is a life-long vocation.

Jesus uses analogy from daily life like poverty, hunger and happiness to inform us that the world of God is at odds with the material world. Ultimately, He is not telling us to wear a long face but to be mindful to remember that our focus should be on Him and not be sucked into the material world of today. The rewards of eternal life are much more than what we can imagine.

To live out the Beatitudes, one must have the wisdom given by the Holy Spirit as it is not easy to have a disposition that is different from the world. But those who trust in the Lord will not be led astray.

Chair of St. Peter, The Apostle

22nd February

The Chair of Saint Peter, also known as the Throne of Saint Peter, is a relic conserved in St. Peter's Basilica in Vatican City, the sovereign enclave of the Pope inside Rome, Italy. The relic is a wooden throne that tradition claims the Apostle Saint Peter, the leader of the Early Christians in Rome and first Pope, used as Bishop of Rome.

The relic is enclosed in a sculpted gilt bronze casing designed by Gian Lorenzo Bernini in 1647. In 2012, Pope Benedict XVI described the chair as "a symbol of the special mission of Peter and his Successors to tend Christ's flock, keeping it united in faith and in charity."
