

“The Community that Bears Fruit”

Last year while on mission during Lent I was invited by the parish priest to sit in on an RCIA class in one of the rural parishes in the far north of Melbourne, Australia. Being rural the class had only 8 adults who wanted to know more of the Catholic faith.

It was there that I met John (not his real name), one of the 8, an Australian, who worked as an insurance agent for an insurance company about 100 kilometres from the parish. He had a friendly disposition about him and very approachable.

I was wondering whether he was investigating the Christian community. Does he want to be to be like these people? Or being a bachelor, I wondered if it was a love interest whom he had an eye for that drew him to the RCIA program? These thoughts ran through my mind.

Later I found out that John would travel about 100 kilometres where he lived near his work place every Sunday just to attend mass although he was not a Catholic and then he would stay after mass for a cup of coffee, some cake, biscuits and brownies for fellowship with the faithful.

Since I was working in the parish for two weeks, which was part of the mission, I visited some of the parishioners during the day.

There were only two masses on the weekend. One on Saturday evening and the other Sunday morning. It was a small congregation mostly country people who were very hospitable.

On one such visitation, an elderly woman who lived on her own, mentioned to me that John was suffering from an incurable illness, a kind of rare cancer and had not long to live. I was shocked as John was young and did not show any signs of any illness let alone a kind of inoperable cancer.

On the last Sunday I was there, before departing for another parish the next day, John made an appointment to see me after mass. He then told me about his illness and that he found such consolation visiting the parishioners in this small country town. It was through them that he began to know about Jesus and his unconditional love that heals. He wept the very first time he walked into this church, knowing that God loved him not because he is good, but because God is good.

Months later, I received a message from the parish priest than John died peacefully, after being baptised a Catholic. He was 38 years old.

Like the fig tree in today’s gospel this community did bear fruit and will not be cut down.

25th March, Annunciation Of The Lord

The feast of the Annunciation, now recognized as a solemnity, was first celebrated around the fourth or fifth century. Its central focus is the Incarnation : God has become one of us, the Second Person of the Blessed Trinity becomes human. The God-Man embraces all humanity, indeed all creation, to bring it to God in one great act of love. Because human beings have rejected God, Jesus comes to show us the way back to God.

Mary has an important role to play in God's plan. God destined her to be the mother of Jesus. Because Mary is God's instrument in the Incarnation, she has a role to play with Jesus in our redemption. It is a God-given role. It is God's grace from beginning to end.

Mary becomes the eminent figure only by God's grace. Mary is the virgin-mother carrying out the will of God. She received into her lowliness the infinite love of God. She shows how an ordinary human being can reflect God in the ordinary circumstances of life.



She exemplifies what the Church and every member of the Church is meant to become. She is the ultimate person of the creative and redemptive power of God.
