

The King on a Donkey

Everv Palm Sunday. Jesus' triumphant entry into Jerusalem on a donkey reminds us that this act fulfils completely the Old Testament prophesy by Prophet Zechariah (9:9) of the coming Messiah. It is rather strange that the Messiah, the Son of David and King of the Jews, would come on a lowly barnvard animal such as the donkey. It is more realistic to envision the Messiah as a King. richly robed and crowned, riding majestically into Jerusalem on a magnificent stallion.

But in the Old Testament, a king came riding upon a horse when he was bent on war; he rode upon a donkey when he was coming in peace. Therefore Jesus' entry into Jerusalem symbolized his entry as the Messiah, as the Prince of Peace; and not a warmongering king bent on subjecting people to his will.

Jesus was about peace and not power. This Prince of Peace was born in a manger and raised as a carpenter in lowly Nazareth. It is clear that God never intended his promised Messiah to come immediately "packaged" as a mighty King. He would promise peace to all as a humble servant of God, obedient to God's will. As St. Paul explains in the Second Reading today:

"His state was divine, ... but emptied himself to assume the condition of a slave; and being as all men are, he was humbler yet, even accepting death on a cross." 300 Thomson Road, Singapore 307653

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And we will recall Jesus' humility and obedience this Holy Week when we follow Jesus through his final days. Jesus will be betrayed, denied, mocked, scourged, crowned with thorns, made to carry his own cross and finally, crucified. But Jesus did not waver or give up. He loved his Father in heaven, and he loved us. He also trusted in his Father. As the Prophet Isaiah prophesied in the 1st Reading about the Messiah who would suffer grievously:

"The Lord comes to my help, so that I am untouched by the insults. So, too, I set my face like flint; I know I shall not be shamed."

The events of Palm Sunday and the Holy Week challenge me. I. as a disciple of Jesus, am also called to be humble and obedient to God's will. I am promised peace when I love and sacrifice. So do I love and trust God enough to surrender my will? Or, am I still trying to persuade God to fulfil my list of wants? In my relationships with others, am I humble and at peace? Am I willing to sacrifice? I know that I am ready to sacrifice for the people I love and care for, but I need more strength to sacrifice my time, energy and effort for people I do not care, or even like. I pray for the Lord to walk with me. I. too, will not be shamed if I seek to do what would be pleasing to God.

The greater the love, the greater the sacrifice. May I learn to love and sacrifice as my King on the Donkey, my Prince of Peace!

Novena notes

14th April, Palm Sunday

Palm Sunday is the final Sunday of Lent, the beginning of Holy Week, and commemorates the triumphant arrival of Christ in Jerusalem, days before he was crucified.

Palm Sunday is known as such because the faithful will receive palm fronds which they use to participate in the re-enactment of Christ's arrival in Jerusalem. In the Gospel, Jesus entered Jerusalem riding a young donkey, and to the praise of the townspeople who threw clothes, palms and small branches in front of him as a sign of homage.

Palm branches are also a widely recognized symbol of peace and victory.

The use of a donkey instead of a horse is highly symbolic, it represents the humble arrival of someone in peace, as opposed to arriving on a war horse.

During Mass, palms are distributed to faithful who carry them in a procession into church. The palms are blessed and many people will fashion them into small crosses. These may be returned to the church, or kept for the year.

Because the palms are blessed, they are appropriately gathered at the church and incinerated to create the ashes that will be used on Ash Wednesday.

The colour of the Mass on Palm Sunday is red, symbolizing our redemption in blood that Christ poured out on the cross.
