

Quo Vadis?

Christian tradition says that one night, the Apostle Peter was fleeing Rome because the Roman authorities wanted to put him to death. He then met the Risen Christ on the Appian Way (outside Rome), and Jesus was walking towards Rome. Peter asked the Lord: Quo vadis, Domine? (Latin; In English: 'Where are you going, Lord?') Jesus replied: "To Rome, to be crucified again!" Peter turned back and returned to Rome. A few days later, he was arrested by Emperor Nero and crucified – upside down.

In today's Readings, we sense the urgency of the mission and the resolution of those called to respond to the mission. In the Gospel, we hear that Jesus "resolutely took the road for Jerusalem": knowing very well that there is where he will suffer and die. He offered his message to every town and village. He did not punish those who refused to respond, but just went on to the next place. In the 1<sup>st</sup> Reading, Elisha is called by Prophet Elijah. Elisha, the son of a wealthy man, wanted to say farewell. But he had to make the decision to respond then and there, and he did. And after Elijah was taken up to heaven, Elisha was the Prophet in Israel for six decades.

On Saturday, 29 June 2019, we celebrated the Solemnity of Saints Peter and Paul, and we recall the splendid faith and mission of our two greatest Apostles. St. Peter was the appointed 'Rock', the leader of the early Church, as it grew. St. Paul, the Apostle of the Gentiles, travelled tirelessly to preach the Good News to

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the non-Jews, and had encouraged the growth of the Christian communities and churches in these places. Both suffered numerous persecutions. But both were resolute to the end

Jesus in today's Gospel makes clear what the duty of his disciples are: "Your duty is to spread the news of the kingdom of God"? St. Paul in the 2<sup>nd</sup> Reading reminds us that we are to be guided by the Holy Spirit, and to avoid self-indulgence by serving one another in "works of love".

So what about us? As Christians, are we different? Have we made a difference? What are we doing to spread the news of the kingdom of God? How have we shared the kingdom values of love, forgiveness and humble service in our homes, schools, work places, communities and ministries?

I like this idea of "works of love". So I now consciously try and do one 'work of love' - everyday. Then I try to do another, and then another, and offer all these to God during my night prayer.

We have only one life to lead and we may not have the time to do God's work later. We need the people around us to experience the kingdom of God here and now. So changing the above story a bit, what will our response be if Jesus should meet us on our way and poses to each of us the same question: *Quo vadis?*

## Novena notes

### Memorial of Blessed Gennaro Maria Sarnelli CSsR, 30<sup>th</sup> June 2019

Gennaro Sarnelli was born in Naples on 12 September 1702. He had a solid cultural and spiritual formation, dedicating himself to the study of jurisprudence, he gained a doctorate in civil and canon law at the age of twenty. Caring for the sick in the hospital for the incurables, he felt the call to the priesthood.

During this time, he also came to know Alphonsus Maria de Liquori. who was his first biographer. Ordained a priest in 1732, he dedicated himself especially to the catechesis of young boys and to the rehabilitation of girls at risk of becoming prostitutes. In June of the following year, he entered the Congregation of the Most Holy Redeemer, founded by Alphonsus Maria de Liquori on 9 November 1732. He dedicated himself to the preaching of the Word of God to those who were most destitute of spiritual help.

For reasons of health, in 1736, he returned to Naples, where he took up again his previous pastoral and charitable activities, especially among the sick, the elderly, those in prison and the young boys forced to work as dock labourers. He also initiated a fervent movement against the spread of prostitution.



A prodigious writer, he published more than thirty books on a wide range of subjects:

In 1741, he organized and took part in the great mission among the spiritually abandoned areas in the outskirts of Naples. Spent by his burning zeal, he died in Naples on 30 June 1744, at the age of forty-two. John Paul II beatified him on 12 May 1996.
