

Ambition and Service

Jesus takes the trouble to give his disciples a lesson in private. For the second time he takes them aside and tells them what was going to happen to him. He talks to them about his impending betrayal, death, and resurrection. But they do not understand what he is saying and are afraid to ask him. A reason for this perhaps is that they are preoccupied with their own ambitions and they miss his message completely? They are more interested in who among them is the greatest and the first.

There is nothing wrong with being ambitious, provided it is not out of selfishness, greed, jealousy, hypocrisy or pride. When ambition is driven by these, then it is false ambition. False ambition damages the unity and peace of the community. It results in all kinds of bad behaviour.

Jesus does not condemn ambition. He redefines it. For Jesus, to be great is to serve others before self and to be first is to make ourselves last. This is one of the hardest lessons for us to learn. It goes against the grain of all that we have been taught to understand and do in our society. Being a servant doesn't sit well with our personal pride and ego. Placing ourselves last doesn't give a boost to our sense of worth and selfesteem. We want to be served and we demand to be first in everything.

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When we think of it, who are the really great people in the world - the ones who are admired and remembered fondly? Can we name a few men and women who inspire us by their lives and who have made a difference in the lives of others? I can think of these few:

William Wilberforce - the 19th century British politician, born into luxury and privilege and fought to abolish British homeland slavery.

Corrie ten Boom - the Dutch woman who hid and protected Jewish people from the Nazis, was taken away with her family to a prison camp, and survived to spread the powerful message of forgiveness.

Amy Carmichael - she spent 55 uninterrupted years in southern India, saving many children from prostitution.

Ben Carson - raised by a single mother in inner-city Detroit, he became head of neurosurgery at Johns Hopkins and was the first person to successfully separate twins born joined at the back of the head.

These women and men had ambitions of their own but they understood the message of Jesus. Their ambition in life was to embrace and welcome "little ones" in the name of Jesus. They put their brothers and sisters first and served them with their lives.



Novena notes

26th September, Feast of Blessed Gaspar Stanggassinger, CSsR

Gaspar Stanggassinger was born in Berchtesgarden, Germany on 12 January 1871. From his youth, Gaspar had a desire to become a priest. He used to engage his brothers and sisters with preaching and processions. At the age of ten, he went to Freising to continue his schooling where he found the studies rather difficult. But he succeeded in making steady progress with effort and prayer.



In 1884, he was admitted to the minor seminary in Freising. In 1890, after his diploma, he entered the diocesan seminary and it became clear to him that the Lord was calling him to live as a religious. In 1892, after a visit of the Redemptorist missionaries, he was inspired to follow their vocation as missionaries. In spite of his father's opposition, he entered the novitiate the same year and was ordained a priest in 1895.

Gaspar entered the Congregation with the intention of preaching the Gospel to the most abandoned. He was deeply devoted to the Eucharist and in his preaching invited all to have recourse to the Blessed Sacrament in times of need and anxiety.

He was proclaimed blessed by John Paul II on 24th April 1988.
