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A Time of Trial - A Time of Growth

On Wednesday, we began the season of Lent. Every year, we try to think of what penance we can do, what we can give up or what sacrifices we can make. It appears that this year, with the outbreak of the Corona Virus, our penance has already been decided. Some places in China are under lockdown. The church in Singapore has suspended all masses and public gatherings. A church in South Korea has been responsible for hundreds of cases. In a sense, this is like the desert that we have been sent into, just as Jesus went into the desert at the beginning of his ministry.

The 40 days of Lent are inspired by these 40 days that Jesus spent in the desert - the story we heard in the Gospel today. Like Jesus, we feel inspired to dedicate ourselves to fasting and prayer, to renew our faith and to bring about a real change in our lives.

What is the change or conversion that God is calling us to at this time? Are we challenged to have more faith and trust in God? Are we challenged to find new ways to pray in community or preach the Good News? Maybe we are being challenged to understand what social responsibility means for a Catholic living in the larger society?

Jesus goes into the desert to discern what his Father wants him to do. There, he faces temptations that distract him, that try to make him deviate from his mission but Jesus overcomes these and remains faithful to his Father's will

Today we might ask, why is God allowing this to happen? Why isn't God sorting out this problem? From the beginning, we have had to deal with the question of evil. sin and suffering. The Book of Genesis tells the story of Adam and Eve and how they broke their promise to God. They preferred to follow their own will rather than God's will and that was the beginning of all of our human suffering. The Book of Genesis wants to remind us that God does not give us suffering. Nor is any trial that we face a punishment from God. Suffering is a natural part of life. But it is through suffering that we learn and grow. Paul reminds us that the sin of Adam and Eve was not the end. Along comes Christ who brings us salvation and life.

Any suffering and trial is not the end. As Jesus came to a clearer understanding and commitment to his mission in the desert, we too can towards а stronger commitment in our faith through this season of Lent. May the Spirit of God lead you just as she led Jesus.

Season of Lent

Lent is the period of 40 days which comes before <u>Easter</u> in the Christian calendar. Beginning on Ash Wednesday, Lent is a season of reflection and preparation before the celebration of Easter. By observing the 40 days of Lent, Christians replicate Jesus Christ's sacrifice and withdrawal into the desert for 40 days. Lent is marked by abstinence, both from food and festivities.

Whereas Easter celebrates the resurrection of Jesus after his death on the cross, Lent recalls the events leading up to and including Jesus' crucifixion.

The Christian churches that observe Lent use it as a time for prayer and penance. Only a small number of people today fast for the whole of Lent, although some maintain the practice on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. It is more common these days for believers to sacrifice a particular item or activity such as favourite foods or smoking. Whatever the sacrifice it is a reflection of Jesus' own sacrifice on the cross.

Why 40 days?

40 is a significant number in the Jewish-Christian scriptures:

In Genesis, the flood which covered the earth was brought about by 40 days and nights of rain.

The Hebrews spent 40 years in the wilderness before reaching the land promised to them by God.

Moses fasted for 40 days before receiving the ten commandments on Mount Sinai.

Jesus spent 40 days fasting in the wilderness in preparation for his ministry.

Most Christians regard Jesus' time in the wilderness as the key event for the duration of Lent.
